What is it?

- 4000 characters, 47 lines
- An essay about yourself about who you are, why you want to study medicine, and why you would be a good doctor
- Used for interview selection

- Motivation to study medicine and genuine
 Conscientiousness interest in the medical profession
- Insight into your own strengths and weaknesses
- The ability to reflect on your own work
- Personal organisation
- Academic ability
- Problem solving
- Dealing with uncertainty
- Manage risk and deal effectively with problems
- Ability to take responsibility for your own actions

- Insight into your own health
- Effective communication, including reading, writing, listening and speaking
- Teamwork
- Ability to treat people with respect
- Resilience and the ability to deal with difficult situations
- Empathy and the ability to care for others
- Honesty

Structure

- Motivation & commitment to study medicine
- Work experience
- Voluntary work
- Academic & extracurricular achievements (Essay prize!)
- Extra reading books, podcasts, courses, etc.









What makes a good personal statement?

- Well-defined, specific motivation to study medicine be honest
- Pick out experiences that highlight your best characteristics
- Show that you have a good understanding of what a career in medicine looks like
- What did you do? What did you learn from it? How has/is this going to impact you?
- Show, don't tell









Example

- I like working with other people.
- Whilst shadowing in neuropsychiatry and paediatrics departments for 6 weeks in Korea, I learnt how collaborative patient care is, as carried out by members of an MDT. Captaining softball, leading Peer-Tutoring, and editing the school paper, I have worked with and led teams of various talents.









Example

• From a young age, my real fascination in life has been science - in particular, the incredible intricacy of the human body. My passion to discover more about its inner workings fuelled my motivation to study medicine, and the challenging yet rewarding nature of the job leaves me certain that I want to pursue it as a career.
